

HISTORY





Madison, Mississippi, named for James Madison, the fourth president of the United States, began along a bustling railroad track in Pre-Civil War Mississippi. In 1856, the Illinois Central Railroad opened its Madison Station, the forerunner of today's City of Madison. Although nearby Madisonville, a settlement established along the stagecoach route of the Natchez Trace, boasted a race track, two banks, a wagon factory, and at least one hotel, its residents could not resist the lure of the future. The newly established railroad community began to thrive, and Madisonville soon became extinct.

Like many railroad towns in the South, Madison Station fell victim to the Civil War. Just 10 miles from the state capital of Jackson, it was largely destroyed after the 1861 siege of Jackson. Although no battles were waged on Madison soil, Major General S.D. Lee, who ordered the first shot of the Civil War, concentrated his command in Madison Station during February 1864. General Lee later became the first president of Mississippi A&M, now Mississippi State University. The railroad continued to serve as a magnet for business growth after the Civil War. In 1897, the Madison Land Company encouraged our northern neighbors to "Go South, and grow up with the country." Located in Chicago on the Illinois Central Railroad line, the Land Company's interest in development prompted Madison to incorporate as a village. However, the charter was later lost when regular elections were not held due to the failure of the "land boom."

The Land Company offered prime land for as little as three dollars an acre. The company boasted that Mississippi had the lowest debt ratio in the nation at \$19 per capita and that Mississippians were declared one-third healthier than people in New York and Massachusetts by "official figures". These figures were quoted with confidence in the Madison Land Company brochure by Bishop Hugh Miller Thompson, the Second Episcopal Bishop of the Diocese of Mississippi and a Madison resident who hailed originally from the Wisconsin heartland.



PARKS









Strawberry Patch Park: Located at 271 St. Augustine Drive

Seven-acre neighborhood park which includes: a one-acre lake, a one-mile lighted walking trail, universal playground equipment, picnic tables, benches throughout, a meeting hall and chapel, restroom facilities, a little free library for kids (book exchange for taking or donating), and the Madison Children's Memorial Garden.

Liberty Park: Located at 100 Liberty Park Drive

Nearly 70 acres of athletic fields and passive park space, which includes: eight lighted baseball/softball fields, four regulation soccer fields, lighted batting cages, two beach volleyball courts, two concession stands, 1.5-mile paved walking trail, Liberty Village playground, and four restroom facilities.

Simmons Arboretum: Located at 583 St. Augustine Drive

Donated by Dr. Walker Simmons and family, the Arboretum includes: a nature area with slag walking trails and wood bridges, an outdoor learning center with labeled Mississippi native plants, trees and shrubs, and an overlook onto the Reservoir.







Madison Station Botanic Garden: Located at the Montgomery House

The Madison Station Botanic Garden is in development and located at the Montgomery House, the midnineteenth-century estate of Hugh and Faye Montgomery. It will feature over seven acres of gardens, trails, courtyards, and more. The gardens will consist of hostas, azaleas, camellias, ferns, and a year-round vegetable garden that will be used for teaching children and adults the importance of agriculture. For outdoor events, there will be a formal garden with pavillion and a large gazebo with rose gardens, perfect for weddings, concerts, and other large gatherings.

Children's Memorial Garden: Located at Strawberry Patch Park

The Children's Memorial Garden is located in Strawberry Patch Park and was established by a group called Too Soon, consisting of parents who have lost a child. It was created as a place where they could visit, meditate on the loss, and celebrate the lives that were gone too soon.

TRANSPORTATION





The Madison Airport at Bruce Campbell Field serves up to 500 planes that fly in and out annually. The City of Madison contracts with Madison Air LLC to provide all services, such as fuel and maintenance, to privately owned planes that are housed at the Airport along with the growing air traffic that uses the field.

The terminal, which opened in 2018, supplies the needs of corporate, charter, and local pilots. A spacious lobby decorated with photographs of Madison's aviation history offers comfortable seating for those waiting for flights. Pilots can find a snooze room, a lounge, showers, and conference rooms.

The Airport can accommodate customers who need rental cars, hotels, caterers, or other items to conduct business once they have flown into Madison.

POLICE DEPARTMENT







Madison has been ranked as the "Safest City in Mississippi" for the past three consecutive years (2019-2021). We have the state's lowest combined rates of violent and property crime in the state. In 2020, there were 0 murders, rapes, or robbery cases in Madison.

- Average 11 violent crimes annually
- Chances of becoming a victim of violent crime in Madison are 1 in 2,522,
 as opposed to 1 in 343 in Mississippi
- Compared to other communities of similar population size, Madison has a crime rate that is noticeably lower than the average

In 2002, the Madison Police Department achieved national law enforcement accreditation through the Commission on Accreditation for Law Enforcement Agencies (CALEA). Since then, the agency has maintained its national law enforcement re-accreditation status every three years. Most recently, the Madison Police Department received its seventh award with the distinction of Meritorious Advanced Law Enforcement Accreditation. The Police Department has also achieved and maintained state law enforcement accreditation through the Mississippi Law Enforcement Accreditation Commission.

FIRE DEPARTMENT





Madison has two Fire Stations: One is located at 7466 Old Canton Road, which was constructed in 1980 as a volunteer fire department but has grown to house full-time firefighters 24 hrs/day. The station consists of three apparatus bays: Rescue 1- Medium Heavy Rescue; Engine 1- 750 gallons of water; Class "A" Pumper, Engine 2- 3000 gallons of water, Tanker. Our other Fire Station is located on Mannsdale Road and was constructed in 2002. This station has two apparatus bays: Engine 3- 750 gallons of water, Class "A" Pumper, and a 1- 75 foot ladder, 500 gallons of water, Class "A" Pumper.

Response: The Fire Department is an All-Hazards Department. It is trained and equipped for numerous types of emergencies such as fire, medical, hazardous material, dive rescue, swift water rescue, high angle rescue, overland search, and rescue.

Medical Emergencies: The #1 daily type of response. The department is staffed and equipped to provide paramedic-level care in the community before ambulance arrival. All firefighters are nationally certified as EMT or paramedics.

Education Classes Provided: Elementary and daycare safety education, babysitting classes, AARP driving classes, CPR to all 9th-grade students every year in the city, bystander CPR, and car seat installation classes.

Community Education: Community safety education is a part of our daily tasks. Being able to prevent injury or an incident, so it never happens is priceless. The department has a full-time Community Educator who teaches and coordinates all community safety education.

Each shift consists of: One Battalion Chief (responsible for daily activities of 24-hour shift)

Three Company Officers (responsible for daily activities of assigned crews)

Ten firefighters (assigned to a crew to carry out daily activities)

54 total fire calls in 2020 • 1,631 total EMS calls in 2020.

HOSPITALS





St. Dominic Hospital is a 571-bed tertiary care hospital located in Jackson serving all of central Mississippi and employs approximately 3,000 employees inclusive of nurses, physicians, and skilled caregivers. The medical staff of nearly 500 leading physicians and specialists make St. Dominic's one of the most comprehensive hospitals in Mississippi.

St. Dominic is located 10 miles from Madison, a 14-minute commute.

Children's of Mississippi is the name for all pediatric services at University of Mississippi Medical Center, the state's only academic medical center.
